LA policies on consultations and engagement

Introduction

Coproduction/Involvement are key "engagement" modes in the development of both Well-Being Plans and Age-Friendly Communities. There was a clear perception in the March Forum Representatives meeting in March that Local Authorities (LAs) have not made progress beyond Surveys and Consultations. This report looks at what information was available on LA websites and would be available to interested residents.

An initial, random search of selected LA websites indicated that there was significant variability in the extent of information available. To do a manual search and report on all 22 LAs in Wales would be prohibitive. The research, therefore, used Artificial Intelligence (AI) as a source. AI software is in an early stage of development and is prone to errors. However, the results here could be tested against the manual findings already found.

Both ChatGPT (Open AI) and BARD could not provide the necessary searches. Below is the quote from OpenAI about Well-Being Plans.

Conclusion

This report includes the text provided by the Bing AI search for each LA. The content is derived entirely from the Web. No direct contact has been made with any LA. Although the question was about Consultation and Engagement, the search was able to find information on other keywords, for example, participation. The information provided reflected what was seen in the manual search of some random samples.

If relevant information does exist, it is not easy to find, even for an IT-literate researcher. Although the information seems non-existent, LAs might go beyond their policies.
